

Curry of fish, meat, egg or vegetables cooked in a spicy sauce plus yellow lentils called *Daal* are served with plain rice.












Shahid Minar


Baitul Mukarram

Stay overnight on vessel!

To experience wild jungle, go deep inside by vessel and stay for some days. You will have more chances to see wild life which is only active in the early morning or at night.

Tour operators organize few days trip in Sundarbans. Special tours such as honey hunt, bird watching, and observing local festivals are also organized as per seasons.





20 minutes from Cox's Bazar, there is a traditional fishermen's village called Shomoti Para. You will find people fishing in traditional way and processing dried fish.






St. Martin's Island

By far the most spectacular Buddhist monuments, discovered in regular excavation are the gigantic temple and monastery. Built in 7th and 8th century, this monastery spreads across 27 acres and embraces 177 monastic cells. The architectural style of Paharpur Vihara is said to give influence to Buddhist temples like Borobudur (Indonesia) and Bagan (Myanmar).

Original relics still remain on Paharpur Vihara though these days relics are replaced by replicas in most archeaological sites.




Paharpur is called Somapura Vihara which means 'moon city'





He adorned the city with mosques, water reserves, roads, bridges and palaces with distinct architectural style. There are many mosques spread throughout the city.

The mosque, one of the largest mosques in Bangladesh was built in 1459 by Khan Jahan. Saith Gumbad means "60 dome" in Bengali, but it has 77 domes over the main hall and 60 stone pillars. The mosque was used for prayer as well as a madrasha and assembly hall





A Tunnel of Cooperation

Gabtoli Bus Terminal Underpass

Dhaka, the capital of Bangladesh, is located at the country's central location as road, rail and air communications hub. In road, communication Dhaka's Gabtoli Bus terminal is the major transit point for travelers to almost entire northern and north eastern districts. This Gabtoli bus terminal hub is used by hundreds of thousands of passengers and tourists.

Mitsubishi Corporation of Japan has recently come forwarded to renovate the underpass at Gabtoli terminal. Then came forward female vocational school graduates from BITAC(Bangladesh Industrial Technical Assistance Center), who gave colorful paint on the underpass walls, and Dhaka North City Corporation (DNCC) committed to maintain it clean, safe, bright and user-friendly in the future.



A JICA volunteer played the role as bridge between Mitsubishi Corporation and Local organizations.

When complete with renovations and paintings, the pedestrian underpass now looks totally new and is more convenient, enjoyable and safer to the users. Gabtoli bus terminal underpass may be a little city-infrastructure, but it demonstrates a big potential for private, public and corporate cooperation or alliance in providing the benefit of development of the people of Bangladesh
